Hello everyone,

Can we believe that Easter is only three weeks away! The students will have three, 4-day weeks to finish off the term. Next Monday 7th the staff will be joined by three other school and CEO staff. We will be led by Dan Petro, a behavioural analyst. The following Monday is the long weekend and the last week of school, we finish on Holy Thursday.

I mentioned attending the Notre Dame mass on Tuesday. It was a beautiful celebration, uplifting and the choir was superb. I attended two Marist schools throughout 7-12. I attend St. Gregory's College in Campbelltown (Sydney) in Years 11/12 which was an all boys school. Listening to the Notre Dame choir brought back a lot of great memories. We had about 95 boarders in our year, so you could imagine us belting out Amazing Grace with the rest of the boarders at Saturday night mass. Music works its magic in so many different ways. Music is one form of prayer and brings people together. The last song I listened to with my Dad at my house, was Amazing Grace, by Mumford & Sons. Playground games

With the change of seasons, comes a change in interests on the playground. We have discussed trying to cater for all sport the best way possible. I had a chat to our Year 5/6 students and offered a few suggestions which included:

I think by next week we will have some dedicated areas. The leadership team and I will share this with the students next Tuesday (Monday- closure day).

Leadership

Positions of leadership are a privilege. I spoke to Year 5/6 yesterday about some on-the-ground qualities of leadership at their age. We discussed that their real qualities shine through during normal activities. These activities include playing before, during and after school, in the classroom, saying hello to parents, teachers, other students and visitors throughout the day, during weekend activities or at mass. There is NO room for any form of bullying, disrespect or provoking others. All the students and teachers are leaders at St. Luke's. We learn from the good choices we make and others make and we also learn from our mistakes. Students need to accept any consequences if they go against our school's values. No person plans to make the wrong choice. Before we judge others, show MERCY, talk to a staff member or talk to me. Our students are good students, but at times we just need to remind them of their commitment as students at St. Luke's Catholic Primary School. As I get to be involved in the community and meet people, I am more and more proud of saying that I am Principal at St. Luke's.

Supervison/Buses

Just a reminder that we provide supervision from 8:30am in the morning and until 3:30pm for car pick up. There are always some one off circumstances out of our control and you do let us know, which we are grateful. I am also aware that some children arrive at school before 8:30am on the early bus and at times being dropped off. We will continue to discuss how we can best cater for everyone's needs, especially in the morning but we are following guidelines and doing the best we can.

I am aware that our children share the bus with other schools. I spoke to Susan Nabbs (Emmaus) and Peter Chalkley (MCP) back in week 2 and we will continue our communication and monitor behaviours.

My story continued..

My years in Temora were great and Temora is just about in the middle of Griffith and Young, where both our parents were born and bred. I believe new opportunities come along for a reason. Leaving Young back in 2006 was different to leaving Temora at the end of 2015. When we left Young, Matilda was a baby and it was about Nicole and I. Leaving Temora with a 5 and 10 year old was a different situation. I believe opportunities are about growth. St. Anne's Temora will benefit from a new Principal, I benefited from spending 9 years at a Josephite school and in a great community, and now I have been inspired by the community of St. Luke's, St. Brendan's Parish and Shepparton. Shepparton was not entirely foreign to me. While I was at university, I would come and watch my older brother play for Yoogali in the soccer. Yoogali and Hanwood have often been part of this league. MAKING JESUS REAL/RELIGIOUS EDUCATION:

Making Jesus Real

The main aim of the Making Jesus Real (MJR) program & the bottom line of Catholic Education is to get students to be aware that they have the spirit of Jesus within them. This is expressed each day by the simple little things we do and say (smile, wave, saying please and thank you, helping people, giving encouraging words, volunteering at home etc, just like you do in your busy life. MJR is simple as we are already doing it and it is just a matter of being switched onto the way we G.T.S. (Greet Treat and Speak to people). These are some of the great MJR initiatives that students can do to bring the spirit alive within themselves and those around them.

- * Be a GIVER rather than a taker.
- * Be a better team player at home (doing as they are asked cheerfully and saying thanks at home a least 4 times daily).
- * Positive attitude to people and life, Believe in themselves (B.I.Y).
- * Be a Grinner and Winner rather a moaner and groaner, Take the good with the bad.
- * Search for the hero inside yourself, search for the secrets you hide.
- * Model at all times WEST attitude
- * Looking at qualities and they picking 3 that they aim to be by the end of the year. (kind Friendly Encouraging, compassionate, helpful, giving of themselves, include others, welcoming, attitude of Gratitude, humble, forgiving, etc.).
- * Peer pressure. "If you want to fly like an eagle don't hang around with the turkeys."
- * Born to try, "the future lies in my hands"
- * Reflecting over my day, 3 things that I should be thankful for that happened today. "A day is wasted if you don't reflect on it. Where was the spirit of Jesus in my life today?
- Compass points for life. Class go through MJR pick 20 attitudes they want for life, bring it down to 10 then 5 and then 1 which is the "Key to their life" the 10 are their compass points for life, we then do orienteering with compasses around the school to get the message.

Scripture Focus: Each fortnight our school community will focus on a piece of scripture linked to a social skills focus to make that important connection between our lives and the life-giving message of God's Holy Word.

'Jesus reminded His followers to listen to understand (Mt 11:15; 13:18; 15:10). Jesus listened and encouraged other to listen.

Whole School Social Skills Focus: For weeks 5 & 6 our social skills focus is LISTENING.

- 1. Look at the person speaking.
- 2. Nothing in hands.
- 3. Look interested

Reporting and Assessment 2016

At St. Luke's Catholic Primary School, our formal reporting systems include written reports at the end of Semester 1 and Semester 2, Parent/Teacher Interviews in Term 1 and Student/Parent/Teacher Interviews in Term 3. Please note that **there are some changes to the timing of these reporting systems for 2016**, as outlined below:

- * Term 1 Parent/Teacher Interviews Tuesday 15th March and Wednesday 16th March
- * Term 3 Student/Parent/Teacher Interviews Tuesday 26th July and Wednesday 27th July

These events are noted on our school calendar and further information regarding them will be communicated closer to each date.

Children's Chatter Matters!

Ten activities will be provided each term focusing on key areas of oral language supporting literacy. Feel free to adjust these activities according to your child's grade level. Ten activities will be provided over this term targeting phonological awareness skills. Phonological awareness is one of the key building blocks for reading and writing. It is listening to, and thinking about the sounds in words.

<u>6.</u> Encourage your child to listen to sounds at the *end* of words. Choose two words from their reader/book and ask them to judge if the two words end with the same sound (say some that match and some that do not). Encourage them to say the words too, and feel the sounds at the end of the words. Then, point out the two sounds at the end.

After mastering this, you might then say two words and ask your child which word has a certain sound at the end. For example, "Which word has the 'd' sound at the end: bed or man (bed)".

ICT INFORMATION SESSIONS - THURSDAY 10TH MARCH 2016



An ICT meeting for parents of new children and children in the middle and senior learning communities is being held on Thursday 10th March at 2pm and 7pm. Notes went home with the children yesterday.

Each year students and families are required to re-familiarise themselves with the schools' Acceptable Use Guidelines. New students to the middle and senior school laptop program will also require a parent/guardian to attend an information session regarding the use of technology in the Middle and Senior learning communities. The invitation to attend the session is also open for all families who have previously attended, as new tools such as Google Apps For Education will be a main focus.

Dear parents

At our school we aim to create a safe and supportive school community for everyone.

Sometimes, it can be difficult for parents or carers to know what to do when their child talks to them about bullying.

You are an important part of our work to prevent bullying and to respond effectively if it happens. Stopping bullying involves everyone.

If your child talks to you about bullying:

 Listen calmly and get the full story. Your calm response is important to allow your child to tell you all about the situation. After they've told you their story, ask questions to get more details if you need to: who, what, where, when. Although you may feel some strong emotions about your child's experience, try to keep calm to avoid more distress to your child.

If your child talks to you about bullying:

- Listen calmly and set the full story.
- Reassure your child that they are not to blame.
- 3. Ask your child what they want to do about it and how you can help
- 4. Visit www.bullyingnoway.gov.au to find some strategies.
- Contact the school.
- 6. Check in regularly with your child.



- Reassure your child they are not to blame. Many children blame themselves and this may make them feel even worse. You could say things like, 'That sounds really hard to deal with. No one should have to put up with that.' or 'I'm so glad you told me. You should be able to feel safe at school; that's not fair at all'.
- 3. Ask your child what they want to do and what they want you to do. A critical part of your response is to avoid jumping in to solve the problem. While it is natural to want to protect your child, helping them to find their own solution is a better option. It helps them feel they have some power in the situation.
- 4. Visit www.bullyingnoway.gov.au to find some strategies. The website has tips and ideas for different bullying situations. One idea is to practise strategies at home to help your child feel more confident.
- 5. Contact the school. Your child may be reluctant for you to do this, so discuss the idea and reassure them that the school would want to know and is able to help. Make an appointment to meet with your child's teacher and, if you need to, ask to talk with the principal. Contact the school immediately if you have a concern about your child's safety.
- 6. Check in regularly with your child. Keep the conversation going. It can take time to resolve issues, so check in regularly with your child about their experiences and their feelings. Your ongoing support is important.

Here are the steps outlined by School Sport Victoria: how to register online for these trials:

The online registration process is open and will close on the 16 March 2016.

Students who turn 13 this year are not eligible to trial.

Step 1: Students consult with Sport teacher/Principal prior to registering on line.

They will give permission for the student to proceed with registering on line only should the student be deemed capable to represent the school and participate in a state level trial. For Division trials schools are required to endorse students with advanced skills.

- **Step 2:** Once the student has been given permission from the Sport Teacher/Principal at their school to register, the family of the student can then proceed to register online and pay the Non-Refundable \$25 Fee. www.ssv.edu.au/teamvic
- **Step 3:** Once registered the family will receive an email confirming receipt of registration. This email will contain 2 attachments, one will be a tax receipt and the second will be an e-ticket.
- **Step 4:** The student must take this ticket back to their school to obtain the signature of the Sport Teacher & Principal. This signature must be obtained before the date of the division trial. This signed e-ticket must then be handed to the Division Trial Coordinator on the day of the trial. (**No Ticket, No Trial**)
- **Step 5:** Shortly after the registration for Division Trials close, Division Coordinators will email the registered students and inform them of the time & place of the trial.
- **Step 6:** After the Division trials are conducted successful students will be given information regarding Region Trials. Those students who are selected at Region Trials will proceed to State Trials (these students will need to re-register and pay the applicable registration fee)

Basketball only - After the Division Trials are conducted students who are asked to proceed will attend a Conference Trial (additional fees are applicable at this level)

Blue Green Algal Bloom Murray River ISSUED: 01/03/16 2:07 PM

This update is being issued by Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning for the Murray River.

Incident Information:

High levels of blue-green algae have been detected in the River Murray between Lake Mulwala and Torrumbarry Weir, the Murray Valley Irrigation Area, Broken Creek and parts of the Torrumbarry Irrigation Area East of the Loddon River. Towns within the affected area include Barham, Cobram, Cohuna, Echuca, Gunbower, Nathalia, Numurkah, Torrumbarry, Yarrawonga

High levels of blue-green algae is potentially toxic to humans and animals.

For your safety, avoid direct contact with this water.

People who come into contact with affected water should wash affected skin immediately with cold clean water.

Water supply from town water systems is safe to drink.

We recommend that people and pets do not enter the water.

An alternative water supply should be sought for stock and pets.

Do not use the affected water for cooking, drinking, washing or showering. Boiling the affected water will not make it safe for these purposes.

Boating is still allowed.




